I cherish many experiences and memories from the times I have been blessed to spend in the Caribbean. One such experience was a brief encounter that provided an opportunity to learn something about life and faith.

It was Wednesday and we had disembarked to explore St. Thomas.

While my wife hunted for the perfect treasures in the market, I found myself investigating a nearby bookstore. As I perused the stacks of books and magazines a clergy person wearing a clerical collar came into the store carrying a Bible, what appeared to be a hymnal, and several copies of bulletins.

I recognized the look on this pastor's face immediately and personally identified with the spring in his step. He was in a hurry! Probably late. I wouldn't have even spoken to him, except that as he scurried to find a particular person (later discovered to be his church organist) he was told that she was upstairs and would be down as soon as possible. As he waited, I introduced myself and asked about the bulletins. They were for the Wednesday Noon Lenten Service and he was there to deliver one to his church organist. I couldn't help but glance at my watch: 11:45. The lateness of the hour explained the spring in his step.

Being an obviously delightful pastor, he invited me to the service and then, observing me glancing at my watch, added with a smile, "We might not start until 12:15 or so." Perhaps it was his gracious invitation or his gentle, playful smile, but this pastor communicated something of the love of God to me in this brief encounter. Haven't we all been there: running late, behind schedule, scurrying about looking for the very person we can't find? We don't generally use that time to entertain inquisitive strangers. This man, however, not only took the time, he invited me to the Lord's house for a time of prayer and worship.

I don't know about you, but my life becomes so hectic sometimes I forget that I am on a journey... a spiritual journey. This journey is what Lent is all about. Lent is a time within our journey that we spend in reflection and prayer, affirming what is essential and repenting from all that leads us away from God. Lent when taken seriously is a time of transformation. We need not be stuck in self-destructive and negative patterns of sin, for by the mercy of God made known in Jesus Christ we can be fundamentally changed. We can be transformed through repentance to a new life, a life of the Spirit.

Where are you on your spiritual journey? Perhaps today you can stop at the crossroads of life, take a break from your frantic pace, and perhaps even put your watch away for a time of fellowship with others in the worship and service of God.

Island Chamber Singers Spring Concert



The Island Chamber Singers will perform Brahms' signature work, A German Requiem, on March 27 and 29 at Amelia Plantation Chapel. The singers will be accompanied by a 12-piece Chamber Orchestra.

Originally written in German and composed of scriptures from both the Old and New Testaments, the chorus will sing an English score and be led by Founder and Director Dr. Jane Lindberg. Featured soloists are Soprano Robyn Marie Lamp and Baritone David Scheininger.

Requiems usually follow the Order of the Mass and focus on the souls of the dead, but Brahms, who began writing the Requiem soon after his mother's death in 1865, focused on scriptures that bring comfort to the living. Probably the most famous piece in the work is the Psalm "How Lovely is Thy Dwelling Place."

Concerts will take place at the Amelia Plantation Chapel, 36 Bowman Road, Amelia Island, on Friday, March 27, at 7 pm, and Sunday, March 29, at 3 pm. An opening night reception will be held in the Fellowship Hall immediately following Friday evening's performance.



Thirty Years of God's Grace

Many of us know that the Chapel's street address on Bowman Road is a tribute to the late Jim Bowman, but if you don't, here's a little background on this founding family.

Jim was one of the original employees of the Amelia Island Company, developer of the Plantation. He arrived on the Island in 1972 with wife Margaret, hired to handle customer service for the villas, and later, convention sales. In 1974 Jim met with Jim Williams, the Amelia Island Company's Public Relations Director, to discuss the prospect of having a church service on the south end of the Island. Soon they were joined by other employees and interested residents, including the late Marge and Tex Crawford and current Chapel members Ron and Janet Kolar, to establish a place of worship in the Plantation.

Jim and Margaret Bowman were instrumental worship leaders in the new congregation. Margaret made a grapevine cross to accompany the Bible and other worship materials which were transported to early services in various Plantation Village buildings. She sang in the first Chapel Choir under Director Barbara Chase, while husband Jim ushered. As we reflect on our beginnings, we are fortunate to have Margaret's copious notes and her timeline of early Chapel years as reference.


The Bowmans were active leaders in their new Plantation community, as well, helping start the Volunteer Fire Department, the Plantation Ladies Club with good friend and Chapel member Marge Crawford, and helped start the Optimist Club. Margaret was active for many years with Amelia Community Theatre Company, where she was wellknown for her creative makeup artistry.

Have you met their daughter, current Chapel member Vicky Bowman Easton? Recently, I had the pleasure of speaking with Vicky about her beloved parents and her memories of the Chapel's early days. Vicky was in her twenties and a United Airlines flight attendant in Atlanta when her parents moved to the Island, and she visited frequently. When her father Jim was diagnosed with bone cancer, Vicky said he amazed everyone with his positive attitude, cheering up all the other chemo patients in the hospital with his jokes and antics while continuing to work for the Plantation, giving tours to new hires. In November 1990, at the dedication ceremony for the Chapel's new Memorial Garden, given by the Bowmans, Vicky recalled that her father's arm was in a sling from a cancer break. Jim Bowman died on June 2, 1991, but his prayers were answered as he lived long enough to see the Chapel built. Margaret died in March 2013 and the Chapel's first full-time pastor, Rev. Dr. Don McGarity, performed both Jim's and Margaret's memorial services.

Today, Vicky and her husband Randy live in her parents' home on the Plantation, which they renovated after moving here from Atlanta. Vicky's daughter Shannon lives on the Island too, and she and husband Ben Langley were married by Rev. Conrad Sharps, who had also baptized Ben years before at First Presbyterian, downtown.

C. Austin Miles was a pharmacist in Pitman, New Jersey, who was deeply engaged one March day in 1912 with his hobby of photography—not just snapping pictures with a camera, but in the darkroom developing his films. It took some time for the image to come to life in the developer tray. While he waited, he let his imagination float and read a passage from the Bible in his hand. He let his mind's eye shift to his garden. Within the light blue glow of the darkroom, he envisioned the sight long, long ago of Mary in white, head bowed and looking into the Tomb as Jesus stood near her.



The pharmacist/photographer awoke from his vision and grabbing a pen wrote as quickly as he could the words that would soon be added to musical notes.

*I come to the garden alone
While the dew is still on the roses;
And the voice I hear, falling on my ear,
The Son of God discloses*



*And He walks with me, And He talks with me,
And He tells me I am His own
And the joy we share as we tarry there*

None other has ever known.

Miles continued to compose many other gospel songs, and said of himself, “It is as a writer of gospel songs that I am proud to be known, for in that way I may be of the most use to my Master, whom I serve willingly although not as efficiently as is my desire.”

Easter Basket Ministry for Nassau County Homeless Students

Our Chapel Family will again provide Easter Baskets for homeless students of all ages who are part of the Nassau County Families in Transition (FIT) program. There are over 500 students enrolled in the program from over 300 families.

Last year our Chapel family and Isle de Mai neighbors prepared 102 baskets. Parents of our FIT students were so appreciative of our contributions—the school ran out of baskets! This year we plan to prepare 120 baskets—30 each for 4 age groups, 2-18 years old.

Each basket contains an Easter or Bible activity book and a Bible story book. Also, a Bible verse coin, Bible verse scrolls and stickers, Bible verse or Cross bracelet, Footprints in the Sand bookmark, crayons, pens or pencils, and personal care items. Little ones receive a stuffed animal, including lambs that play Jesus Loves Me, and small cars and playdough. Of course, colorful eggs full of candy and other special treats are also included!

Monday, March 9, at 9:00am, we will begin the assembly process in the Chapel Fellowship Hall. At 9:00am, 4-5 persons who can carry supplies and help set up tables are needed. At about 9:30, another 10 or so folks are needed to assemble the baskets. As soon as the baskets are completed, usually by noon, 2-3 drivers are needed to deliver the baskets to the FIT Clothes Closet in Yulee. That allows the Clothes Closet staff five Mondays to distribute the baskets to families who come in to shop.

The cost for each basket is about \$20. It was the early 80's. Living in Wyoming, Ohio, a suburb of Cincinnati, Ann Adele, a teacher and Cecil Allf, an oral surgeon, had heard about an island paradise on the Atlantic in North Florida. During a Spring vacation, several couples from their Wyoming country club, long-time golfers and friends, decided to check out a "virgin beach." The group included Glenda and JJ Johnson (P&G executive and a car buff), Harry Duchelli (former B17 pilot in WWII, now 94 and married to Eloise Hill) and his wife, and Ed and Sarah Schmidt.

Another unbelievable coincidence. The Reverend Tom Hilton had been their Interim Pastor at Wyoming Presbyterian Church. When they joined the Chapel, who did they discover was their minister? The same Tom Hilton and his wife Jan. Tom preceded Rev. Ted Schroder.

Other memories about friends from the chapel: Janet Kolar's fancy boutique in the Amelia Shops called the "Sugar Plum"; the impressive interview with Kitty Hunt when joining the chapel; Alan and Joan Donaldson being the first couple to invite them out to dinner as new Chapel members; Sandy Shaw Malone and Ann Adele meeting at a PLA Luncheon and becoming new best friends; Sally Henderson, Claire Salmond, and Ann Adele being the first to be in charge of the candles for Christmas Eve services; Marilyn and Sewell Harlin and Queet Hertwick inviting them to CBS (Community Bible Study). All good memories.

Duke Chorale



The Duke University Chorale will make its fourth visit to Amelia Island in the past 16 years. Director Rodney Wynkoop will be bringing 40 young men and women to the Amelia Plantation Chapel on Wednesday, March 11 at 7:00p. Admission is \$10 at the door. As with their last concerts in 2016 and 2012, overnight housing will be provided by singers in the Choir, Chapel members, and local residents.

As the primary choral group of Duke's Department of Music, the Chorale performs numerous concerts throughout the year, both on and off campus, and tours annually during Duke's Spring Break as will be the case in 2020. In previous years the Chorale has toured China, Italy, Austria, Hungary, Poland, the Czech Republic, England, Wales, Mexico, and many parts of the United States.

The Chorale's repertoire typically features both sacred and secular music ranging from Italian and English Renaissance to contemporary works, from serious to relaxed music, and from unaccompanied works to major pieces with piano and other instruments.

Because of the Chorale's strong ties to the University and community, they sing in such disparate venues as area nursing homes, official university events, and Duke basketball games. Their annual family-style Christmas program fills Duke Chapel to overflowing and supplies vast amounts of food for area homeless shelters.

The Chorale has been conducted by Rodney Wynkoop since 1984. With a Yale musical doctorate, Dr. Wynkoop is Director of University Chorale Music at Duke.

In His Steps By Charles Sheldon

In His Steps is a best-selling religious fiction novel, first published in 1896, and has never been out of print. The penetrating and provocative question, "What would Jesus do?" in all of life's complex situations, is the central theme. This simple maxim creates a profound way of looking at life and both the common and morally challenging dilemmas that one might face. It is a thrilling story of a group of people who pledged to follow "in His steps" for a complete year, asking themselves before each action, everyday, "What would Jesus do?" As the story develops, the shock of implementing this commitment cuts sharply into the fabric of the little town's social and economic frameworks. Nevertheless, the one hundred brave souls soldiered on with this verse as their inspiration:
