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In February, as we start the process of retracing the footsteps of Jesus, let us do so by commemorating the five most important days in Lent which are: 1) Ash Wednesday, 2) Palm Sunday, 3) Maundy Thursday, 4) Good Friday and 5) Easter-Resurrection Sunday! In fact, on each one of these sacred days, Amelia Plantation Chapel has a special worship service to commemorate Christ. Make it a point to join us for each special day as we follow the life of Christ.

The Billy Graham Evangelistic Association provides a concise Lenten summary, "As one of the oldest observations in Christendom, Lenten tradition has changed over the years, but its purpose has always been the same: self-examination and penitence, demonstrated by self-denial, in preparation for Easter. Lent, which comes from an Anglo-Saxon word for 'spring,' can be viewed as a spiritual spring cleaning: a time for taking spiritual inventory and then cleaning out everything which hinders a relationship with our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ."

During this sacred season, please find a key Bible verse that you will meditate on.

My chosen verse is 1 Peter 5:6-7, which says, "Humble yourselves, therefore, under God's mighty hand, that he may lift you up in due time. Cast all your anxiety on him because he cares for you." Another one is the Proverb that reminds us to Trust in God and not lean on our own understanding. Humility before God produces in us a sense of awe of the Almighty, pokes holes in our pride, and stirs us to make better decisions by the power of the Holy Spirit.

Such godly humility will do us all good as we center our hearts on Christ asking God for us to decrease and for Him to increase for the sake of His light and love to shine on more and more people.



January Men's Breakfast Recap

Church member, and ordained minister, Dr. Dennis
Hall presented the Men's Breakfast a scintillating
argument that not only is God sanctifying us, meaning bringing us closer
to righteousness, but he is preparing us through life experiences to help
expand His kingdom. He described experiences from his childhood, from
his days in the military, to his professional life that caused him to develop a
research interest in graduate school aimed at ministries to sex offenders.

Realizing that some sex offenders are prohibited by law from attending church, he developed an interest in podcasting and this former nationally known healthcare executive is now a popular podcaster. He described how

Americans are increasingly choosing not to attend organized church and because of this trend he developed a podcast, known as Church? Hell No, that is aimed at people who choose not to attend church. He gave examples of people who do not attend church because someone at the church hurt them as well as people who do not attend church because they are angry at God. There are many reasons that church attendance is declining and podcasting is one of the ways to reach the unchurched population. More people listen to podcasts than television.

Dr. Hall closed his presentation by stressing that God has prepared each of us for a role in expanding His kingdom and that age is not a deterrent. He quoted General Douglas MacArthur's essay know as Live With Enthusiam. "So long as your heart receives messages of cheer, courage, grandeur and power from the earth, from man and from the Infinite. When the wires are all down, and all the central places of your heart are covered with the snows of pessimism and ice of cynicism, then and only then, are you grown old indeed, and may God have mercy on your soul."



Our Chapel Family will prepare 120 Christ-filled Easter Baskets for our precious homeless students and families. The Easter Baskets will be assembled in the Chapel's Fellowship Hall on Monday, March 4 at 10 am. After the baskets are completed, they will be delivered to the Nassau Schools' Clothes Closet in Yulee. The school liaison, Mollie Cressey, will notify all families in the FIT program that the Easter Baskets are available for pick-up.

Easter Baskets will be prepared for 5 age groups, 1-2, 3-4, 5-8, 9-12, and 13-18. Baskets include Easter story and activity books, New Testament Bibles, devotionals, and other Christian reading materials, Christian bookmarks and bracelets, cross necklaces, Bible verse coins, stuffed animals, games and toys, school and art supplies, personal care items, and treats to eat. Baskets for the three older age groups are specific for girls or boys. The cost per Easter basket is \$40 to \$50 depending on the age group. Thank you to Mollie Cressey, Judy Hall, the Clothes Closet Coordinator, and all of the angel volunteers at the Clothes Closet, for facilitating this partnership between our public schools, our homeless families, and our caring congregation.

Wintley Phipps was born in Trinidad before his family immigrated to Canada at an early age. He became a profoundly gifted, yet unknown, baritone singer. In his early years of trying to launch a singing career, he recorded a few Christian songs with the hope of getting discovered.



One day Wintley was on an airplane where he met a flight attendant. He noticed that she seemed particularly down so he gave her a cassette of one of his very first recorded songs – It Is Well With My Soul. He didn't know what was troubling her but he hoped that this might help lift her spirits.

Soon thereafter, that same flight attendant met a man named Cliff Barrows on another one of her flights. She discovered that Mr. Barrows was the Musical Director for the Billy Graham Crusades. She asked him if he had heard of Wintley Phipps and, unsurprisingly, he had not. She then reached in her purse and gave him the same cassette that Wintley had given to her.

A few weeks later, Wintley received a call from Mr. Barrows and he offered him a job as a soloist with the Billy Graham Crusade. With one phone call Wintley went from an unknown artist to one whose talents are heard and appreciated around the world. His act of kindness and concern for the flight attendant had been repaid a thousand times over.

Great occasions for serving God come seldom, but little ones surround us daily. -Saint Frances



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What Does The Lord Require of Thee?

I fell in love with this verse of scripture as a college junior at the University of Pittsburgh in 1952 when I was asked to chair the Religion-in-Life Week program and Micah 6:8 was chosen as its theme. That was a profound week in my faith journey. This transcendent scripture verse has helped to keep me grounded in my faith.

Chapter 6 of Micah begins with Micah reminding the people of Judah of God's goodness to them-redeeming them from Egyptian slavery and giving them strong leaders such as Moses, Aaron and Miriam, and how He helped them cross the Jordan to settle in Gilgal. But the people of Judah had short memories and forgot about God's covenant with them; they were self-centered and took their gifts from God for granted.

In verses 6 and 7, Micah asks some rhetorical questions – "With what shall I come before the Lord and bow down before the exalted God? Shall I come before him with burnt offerings, with calves a year old? Will the Lord be pleased with thousands of rams, with ten thousand rivers of oil? Shall I offer my firstborn for my transgression, the fruit of my body for the sin of my soul?" Simply stated in contemporary terms, maybe I can bargain with God! Then comes the "money line" in Micah 6:8- "He has showed you, O man, what is good. And what does the Lord require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God."

If we expect social justice to come about through secular institutions, we deceive ourselves. We must have a change in our hearts. We must act justly and love mercy, but you and I need to walk humbly with the Lord. It is the transcendent step that we need to make. The concept is simple, but the step is hard; it requires deep faith and our prayerful commitment to our gracious God!
